Heth Chapter, Corporation Board Take on Challenges

t is an exciting but difficult time as we enter 2001 with a new slate of board members for the housing corporation! Former Board President Mike Ford '90 has moved to New York. We will miss his contributions on the Corporation Board. After many calls to our alumni, we have finally been fortunate to add four new board members who will be assisting in various capacities. This new infusion of energy has been needed for some time. As with any volunteer-based organization, it is difficult to harness the time and energy to effectively meet all of our goals. Our goals include the ownership of a chapter house, building our alumni network, and most importantly, maintaining Acacia's strong presence at the University of Illinois. Our

added board volunteers, who are listed at left, will be assisting with board functions, building our alumni network using technology, helping organize alumni activities and advising the chapter. Our communications during the past 12-18 months have not been as frequent as we would have liked, mainly because of the time and cost involved and the increasingly busy lives of our board members. I believe our fund-raising efforts have suffered as a result. While we historically have achieved satisfactory results in obtaining donations (both annual giving, and Chapter Sponsor and Patron), the past giving year has seen a slight downturn. We appreciate all the support you have given and ask for your continued generosity!

We would like to share with you some information that we feel is important for you to know. Most fraternities on campus, including ours, are seeing their undergraduate leadership being placed at the sophomore level. Most of us would probably agree that we are more comfortable with house leadership — especially for the position of Venerable Dean — at the junior and senior levels. The chapter is faced with the growing attraction of apartment living - without rules or the numerous brothers as housemates — as a competitor to Greek life. That has reduced the number of juniors and seniors who want to live in the chapter house, and as a consequence, it affects our pool of candidates for leadership.

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Jack S. Kilby '42 Wins 2000 Nobel Prize in Physics

ne of our already distinguished alumni, Jack S. Kilby '42 of Dallas, Texas, has won the 2000 Nobel Prize in physics for his part in the invention and development of the integrated circuit (IC). Jack grew up in Great Bend, Kan., and later earned his bachelor

of science and master of science degrees in electrical engineering from the universities of Illinois and Wisconsin, respectively. He invented the IC in 1958 while at Texas Instruments with borrowed and improvised equipment. According to the Nobel Assembly at the Royal

Swedish Academy of Sciences, his invention enabled the microelectronics field to grow to become the basis of all modern technology. His accomplishment was also announced at the Illini football game at this year's homecoming. Jack also

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Sponsors and Patrons Help Chapter Build House Down Payment

In 1995, we launched our first to-be-annual Chapter Patron and Chapter Sponsor Program to raise money toward a down payment to buy a house for Heth chapter and to make major house improvements. We asked each of our more than 800 alumni to contribute \$200 as a Chapter Patron or \$100 as a Chapter Sponsor to help fund the house.

Our first year in the program, 1995, produced \$2,850; in 1996 you contributed \$3,100; and in 1997, we garnered \$5,700, a 100 percent increase over our first year. In 1998, there was a total of \$4,700. That number slipped again in 1999 to a total of \$2,950 in Patron and Sponsor donations, with an additional Benefactor donation of \$500. However, it is great to report that the 2000/2001 giving year has been building with your help. To date, \$3,400 has been donated to the Patron/Sponsor program, with an additional generous donation of \$500 at the Benefactor level. We are also thankful to the 34 alumni who have donated a total of \$1,725 to the annual giving program. A list of those contributors is included on Page 4 of this newsletter. It is gratifying to know that so many of you have supported our fraternity communications program and are dedicated to its survival.

But the need is still there, and a large pool of Heth chapter alumni have not yet responded. The funds raised each year are currently being reserved for a down payment on a chapter house and may also be used to make cosmetic and structural improvements to our leased house, improvements for which the landlord is not responsible. These improvements are necessary for:

- The safety and well-being of the undergraduates,
- Keeping Heth chapter competitive with other fraternities,
- Ensuring all alumni a place to return in years to come, and
- Allowing other fine young men to enter the ranks of Acacia Fraternity in the future.

The longer it takes for us to gather the necessary funds for a down payment on our own house, the more we must invest in a house that we do not own. In short, we still need your help.

What makes us proudest about our computer lab is that we did most of the construction ourselves. Many more house improvements are

planned for the future, and in another two years, I can guarantee that the house will be even better.

Even though we know that social events are not the only thing that a fraternity house is about, we take great pride in our social calendar. This semester's events have proved to be some of the best. Our serenades were so creative and genuine that we were paired with the top sorority houses on campus. It is safe to say that this semester, our social calendar is one of the best on campus. We are very proud that all our hard work and dedication toward improving our image on campus is paying off.

Oh goodness, how time flies. My term as Venerable Dean is coming to a close. I feel as though I made a positive contribution during my year in office. The most comforting feeling I have right now is that the next generation of leaders will do an even better job than we have. Things will only get better and the future is bright for the Heth chapter.

We have as many out-of-house members as in-house; however, we are not the only house on campus to experience this shift. We are focusing on selling the program that Acacia has to offer - and we believe it remains a strong one - that fosters the ability to work with others, communicate and contribute to the success of an organization while experiencing a strong sense of brotherhood. However, it has been a difficult task to address the need for strong leadership, values and continuity at the undergraduate level.

Please bear with us as we try to guide the undergraduate chapter to refocus on the physical structure. Please also communicate your comments to the undergraduate chapter and especially to us. Your communication assists us in our roles and is very important to us!

With all that said, we believe that Acacia still has a bright future at the University of Illinois. The undergraduate

chapter continues to excel at rushing top-quality students and has approximately 90 members. We are seeing positive things from the undergraduates, despite their need to do some refocusing. The addition of new blood to the board is *buge*! So please join us in our efforts, support us, call your Acacia friends with whom you haven't talked in some time, reminisce with them and catch up on life events, and make a brief stop by the chapter house at 907 South Third Street in Champaign when you're there.
