## **ALUMNI PRESIDENT'S REPORT**

# Commitment Overcomes Obstables Acacia Achieves 100 Years

For many of us who witnessed past successes and heartfelt losses of Acacia Fraternity at University of Illinois, our achievement of 100 years as a top Fraternity on campus seemed challenging. The reality is that we have achieved this Milestone! This year marks the 100 Year Anniversary of our Charter filed on April 28th, 1906. The Acacia Illinois Chapter is 77 members strong and in solid financial condition! With this achievement comes our realization that Acacia Fraternity can achieve the greatness and stature on which it was founded, by applying fundamental principles of Acacia's teachings. You will have the opportunity to "smell the roses" on this Milestone occasion, at a special Homecoming Celebration with our fellow brethren on October 7, 2006. This will be an event to be remembered in Acacia's history, and all those in attendance will be recorded in Acacia's history as well!

### Restructuring is Historically Significant

Acacia has undergone a complete restructure of historical significance over the past several years leading to this Milestone. The restructure started when the Board issued a series of Directives (authored by Art Mertes) to the Chapter in Fall 2003 that set out the Board's absolute requirements for the Chapter in areas of member development, operations, and accountable membership. The Chapter issued its Strategic Plan in 2005 structured around the Board Directives and more. The Corporation's organization was completely restructured in 2005, pursuant to revised Board, Officer & Volunteer Roles (authored by Adam Powers). These roles take into account alumni feedback and insights and were designed around two fundamental principles: Leading the Chapter and Serving the Alumni. Further, Acacia has adopted new Mission Statements that focus on excellent principles. Moreover, the Board determined that the Fraternity could not compete at 907 S. Third St. and leased 211 E. Daniel Street (the  $\Sigma AE$  Fraternity house) through Spring 2009. This has allowed us to require stricter contracts fostering greater accountability of student members.

#### **Factors Driving Successful Results**

Marking our 100 Year Anniversary, things are very positive on multiple fronts at the Illinois Chapter! We attribute this to a variety of factors: (1) greater involvement of volunteer alumni under restructured Chapter, (2) more frequent interaction between Board and Chapter Executives, (3) sound business practices including strong contracts, invoicing and collection policies, new formalized house rules, outside property management, continuity guidelines and enforcement, (4) Chapter refocus on pride and respect for property, individuals, and human service, (5) focus on development of leadership in Chapter members, at Chapter and campus levels, (6) revised initiation week and pledge programs focused on reducing exposure and fostering scholarship, integrity, respect and good character, and (7) undergraduate Chapter membership committed to the "restructured" Acacia. These factors, among others, are continuing to develop the strong program that Acacia has to offer to Illinois students. Furthermore, our Alumni communications have increased in frequency due to more volunteers and more contributions. We will commemorate 100 years with a 100 Year Alumni Directory!

#### **Ritual & Acacia Mission**

This year marks the induction of Jack Kilby '42, Role #601, the inventor of the integrated circuit and a Nobel prize winner, into our local ritual in a very special way. His name will be as well known in Acacia ritual as that of W. Elmer Eckblaw. This year also marks the Board and Chapter's adoption of the Acacia National Fraternity Mission. Acacia's ritual focusing on Human Service, which started with B.E. Deroy to G.A. Malcolm (the Founding Fathers of Acacia International Fraternity), has continued.

#### Thanks to our Volunteers & Supporters

The stewardship, dedication, perseverance and leadership of volunteer alumni have made achievement of this 100 Year Milestone possible. Please extend your thanks to all of the Corporation Board Members and Volunteers, past and present, for helping us get this far. As I think about writing this article, I'm already looking forward to Homecoming on October 7, 2006. Many of us will be getting together to mark the 100th Anniversary of Acacia's Illinois Chapter. I'm also looking forward to attending the Rutgers football game in September with seven other alumni from the New York area. It is events like these that remind me of what has remained the most important experience of being an Acacian, the friendships that I have made. It is these friendships that make us drive across country with a van load of kids to see each other for the 4th of July, make us leave work early to catch a Cub's game, host a Super

Bowl party full of Acacia alums, or buy a block of tickets to watch the Illini basketball game each year at the United Center. It is also these friendships that have led many of us to go into business together, stand up in each others weddings, be Godparents to each others' children, and be there for one another in times of crisis.

While I think of how valuable these friendships are to me, I am also fearful that there will not be another 100 years of Acacia friendships without greater support from our Alumni.

I understand that many do not understand what is required to run an active chapter. For the past 15 years, Acacia has survived at Illinois, but only because of the actions of a very small percentage of our Alumni. Despite having an alumni base of over 1300, we've only managed to have about a dozen alumni on the corporation board during the past 15 years – at times only two or three. Most years, we've had only 30-50 alumni send in their annual dues – about 3% of our base. Until now, we've gotten by with the support of that 3%, but that won't get us by for much longer.

The Fraternity and Corporation Board are stronger today than it has been in the past 15 years. The board has attracted more volunteers and has made more progress than it had in the previous 15, all because of the efforts of our alumni. For the first time in a long time we are in a position to move forward in a positive direction and will be looking to our alumni for a course of action. Note the positive comments made by the Assistant Dean of Students in this *Hello*.

In the next couple of years, our alumni, both you and I, will need to decide whether or not to commit to building or buying a permanent home for Acacia at Illinois. If we decide to, it will be due to the alumni's positive actions, such as volunteering their time, money or leadership skills.

## **HISTORY OF ACACIA ILLINOIS**

## A Look at the Past 100 Years at Acacia in Champaign, Illinois High Academics and Moving Houses Remain a Trend for Acacia at Illinois

Founded April 28, 1906, The Pythagoras Club was chartered as the sixth chapter of Acacia Fraternity. During its first eight years, the Illinois Chapter was located at 505 East Green Street in the heart of "Fraternity Row."

Disaster struck Acacia when a fire, started by an arsonist (never apprehended) who torched other University buildings the same night, destroyed the house. The ramifications of that fire have plagued the fraternity to this date.

In 1914, an Old English country house with gables and a high-pitched roof was built at 501 E. Daniel, just two blocks south of the old location. It was an ideal location, providing an excellent view of the southward growth of the University of Illinois campus and the corresponding shift of fraternity houses. The house was considered to be one of the finest examples of architectural design in the country.

The architectural committee, with which one of the members of the chapter collaborated, planned well in designing the house to accommodate thirty-five men. The main floor provided spacious living rooms, a chapter room, a library of 800 volumes, a sun porch, and a guest room. The dining room and the kitchen were located in the basement. The cost of the property was \$40,000.

As the chapter grew steadily in size, it became necessary to provide more housing. In 1946, a large framed house next door was purchased for \$20,000 and was used as an annex until the 1970s remodeling resulted in a larger overall structure that combined the two buildings. The old annex was then demolished.

When reviewing the chapter's accomplishments scholastically, it was stated in a 1947 Pythagoras manual that the chapter had placed 26 times in the upper five, and 37 times in the upper ten of the national social fraternities. There were more than 60 fraternities on the campus at that time. By comparison, in 2006, there were 43 fraternities. High scholarship has remained a fundamental element in the fraternities' objectives.

Disaster struck Acacia when a fire, started by an arsonist (never apprehended) who torched other University buildings the same night, destroyed the house. The ramifications of that fire have plagued the fraternity to this date. While the insurance

payment of \$1,150,000 was forwarded within sixty days, the cost of reconstruction exceeded that amount in excess of \$500,000. A mortgage was obtained and the house was rebuilt and occupied. Eventually it became impossible to service the mortgage, and after all other alternatives failed, the fraternity

sold the building to the University. Although interior remodeling of the new building occurred, the exterior remains very faithful in appearance to the rebuilt house.

Without a physical house, the fraternity remained viable on campus nevertheless. Two years later, the Board of Directors obtained rented facilities at 907 S. Third. This location was occupied until 2005. Acacia then obtained a four-year lease and moved to the unoccupied  $\Sigma AE$  house at 211 E. Daniel, just two blocks west of the original property. The Board of Directors is currently pursuing a course of action that will return Acacia at Illinois to its own permanent house within the next three to four years. A determined Board and a supportive alumni body will make that possibility a reality.


