Excitement Builds Among Chapter Members

Toward the end of the first year of living in the new house, active brothers expressed a desire to make 302 East Armory more unique to Acacia. With phase two of the "Man-Up" project continuing into the summer, the timing was right for a chapter driven renovation. The active chapter, who provided its own funds for the project, campaigned for help from the Corporation Board, who graciously decided to match their investment. It was quickly decided that the Multipurpose Room, an almost 700 square foot room that connects the dining area, courtyard and east wing, would be the focus of the renovation effort.

With several goals in mind to make the room more formal, durable and to distinguish the Acacia house from other fraternities, planning for the renovation began in March and construction began in May, immediately following the end of school. Renovation projects included the removal

House Director Update

First let me start by saying "Thank You" for allowing me the opportunity to work, learn and grow with this Fraternity. I spent the last five months getting familiar with the property, current chapter members and the Alumni that I have been fortunate enough to meet thus far.

I began my tour of duty at the end of February and have seen many changes to the property since that time. The house was in good shape, but it needed some repairs and updates to ensure its viability in the years to come. During the summer break, the house was cleared of all unnecessary and/or unusable furniture and clutter. New carpet was installed in the west wing staircase from top to bottom and most of the interior received a fresh coat of paint. The most exciting change was the complete renovation of the Multipurpose Room. The concept for the renovation was conceived by the Chapter, approved by the Alumni Board and completed by Payan Maintenance Service who exceeded expectations.

While the interior of the house received many updates, the exterior was also improved upon. Fernando Payan and I mulched the flower beds and maintained the yard to such a level that the house was recognized by Campus Housing as an example for others to follow. I am very proud of that accomplishment and look forward to keeping the grounds in pristine shape from here on out. A new set of concrete steps were poured on the west side of the building that now connects the west exit door to the sidewalk. Residents are now able to use that door without being forced to cross the lawn, which saves the lawn from being trampled on while adding another entrance/exit for the residents to utilize.

All of the projects completed, along with those not mentioned due to space constraints, led to the house being ready for the 2013-2014 academic year. The house was turned back over to the chapter officers on August 19 in great shape, and what I consider to be a solid foundation for future growth and advancement of this fraternity.

Any alumni who would like to see the progress first hand should stop by the house and see for themselves. The future success of the house depends on the transparency of expectations from the Alumni to the current Chapter Officers, with a complete understanding of the current conditions as a baseline for the minimum acceptable standards of safety and cleanliness of the house.

Summer Work Completed

The Corporation Board executed projects this summer totaling \$45,000 to continue improvement of the house and property. Work was planned and began soon as the house was vacated for the summer.

The largest single project undertaken was the remodeling and refurbishment of the Multipurpose Room on the lower level between the East and West Wings. It was a cooperative project with the cost shared equally between the Corporation Board and the Active Chapter. (See the Multipurpose Room renovation article on page one of this issue of the Hello.)

Exterior work included restoration of stone and brick masonry to maintain structural integrity and weather resistance. Mortar joints were inspected and re-pointed where necessary. Joints around all windows were inspected and resealed. The brick retaining wall in the lower courtyard was cleaned and treated with water repellant to prevent deterioration from winter freeze/ thaw cycles. New concrete steps were installed from the door at the west side of the house down to the public sidewalk.

Many large and small projects were accomplished in the interior of the house. Life safety work was done to comply with the most recent inspection by the city's Building Safety Department. The security alarm system was upgraded for better monitoring and more comprehensive protection. Heating system repairs and improvements were made. The Laundry Room was upgraded with shelving and a new epoxy

floor finish. New carpet was installed in the West Wing stairwells and in the Alumni Room on the first floor. Many rooms and spaces received a fresh coat of paint and the entire house was thoroughly cleaned from top to bottom in readiness for the members return to school.

With cooperation from the Active Chapter, the Corporation Board will continue to maintain the property in the best of condition. We will strive for upgrades and improvements year after year to provide a healthy up-to-date facility that both Active members and Alumni can be proud of.

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of carpet/tile floor in favor of rubber/vinyl floor as well as changing the old suspended tile ceiling with more modern, durable recessed tiles. In order to add functionality and fraternal style, drywall was replaced with MDF (micro-dense fiberboard) and decorative trim, resulting in nearly indestructible walls and a more classic appearance. A door was added between the dining area and the Multipurpose Room, dampening sound and allowing a sectioning off the room for smaller gatherings.

The most impressive addition to the room, however, was a mural painted by local muralist Glen Davies who has created numerous pieces of art for the University and around campus. The mural was custom-made for Acacia. It was designed by the active chapter as well as alumni, including input from current and former Archivists. The resulting 12' x 7' national ritual themed mural features the Acacia crest, name, founding date and numerous more subtle images that only a genuine Acacian could discern. It is nothing short of awe inspiring and has truly become the focal point of the room.

The entire renovation was planned by the active chapter and was completed



ahead of schedule in late July. Furniture was delivered in mid-August just before the fall move-in period. The new space provides actives with a large, durable and refined area for activities, lounging and holding chapter wide meetings. All Acacians can be proud of this newly designed space. Alumni returning to campus are encouraged to drop by the house to see it for themselves.
